





The Western Shoshone and the Northern Paiute Tribes live on the Duck Valley Indian Reservation.

The Duck Valley Indian Reservation is situated in a beautiful, green valley on the Nevada and Idaho border. It was established by Executive Order in 1877, selected by a Shoshone Leader. In 1886 and again in 1910 additional land was annexed to provide for Shoshone & Paiute peoples who later came from the nearby areas to live. Today approximately 2,300 hold membership at Duck Valley.





- Participate in planning youth activities, youth recognition programs, and planning for the seminar next year.





No requests will be accepted after this date. Non Indian youth may contact their local council, Boy Scouts of America or Girl Scouts of the USA for possible financial assistance.

Important Reminders

- ✓ Early Bird Registration Deadline: **JUNE 10th**.
- ✓ Refund request must be in writing. **NO REFUNDS** after **July 1, 2014**.
- ✓ Youth participants **MUST** be at least **12 yrs. old** or **entering 7th grade** and registered with Boy Scouts or Girl Scouts.
- ✓ All Youth **MUST** be accompanied by a responsible adult.
- ✓ "Tag-a-longs" (underage child under the direct care of their parents) must pay full fee and register.
- ✓ Local transportation will be provided from the Boise Airport to the college.
- ✓ ALL participants must complete and submit the registration form, participant agreement and photo release and health history. The completed health form is to accompany the participant to the seminar and is turned in at the registration table at check-in. **Do not mail this form.**
- ✓ Youth participants not attending with parents must submit parent permission.
- ✓ Bring your traditional dress for social dancing (or other appropriate clothing) and the Parade of Traditional Clothing.
- ✓ Bring your tribal flag!
